Dear Majority Leader McConnell:

The undersigned residents of Kentucky ask for your support to ensure our students have high-speed home internet access and devices so they can continue learning during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Many things are uncertain about the 2020–2021 school year. One thing, however, is quite clear: online learning is going to be one of the ways students receive instruction when schools reopen. Unfortunately, many students do not have the technology at home that is needed to participate in online learning. This “homework gap” could set back a generation of Kentucky’s students.

Three in ten families across our state do not have high-speed home internet access, including nearly 300,000 children. In addition to high-speed home internet, each student needs a connected device—a desktop, laptop, or tablet—to participate in online learning. Unfortunately, 12 percent of households in our state do not have one of these devices, including nearly 127,000 children.

Communities of color, low-income families, and families in rural areas are hit hardest by the digital divide. Nearly half of households in our state with an annual income below \$25,000 do not have high-speed home internet. In addition, three in ten households in rural Kentucky do not have high-speed home internet. Moreover, one in five Black households and one in four Latino households do not have a desktop, laptop, or tablet computer.

COVID-19 did not create the homework gap; however, it increases the urgency to equip our students with the technology needed to participate in online learning. Thankfully, the homework gap is a solvable problem. An estimated \$6.8 billion is needed to make high-speed home internet and devices available to students in Kentucky and across the country during the 2020–2021 school year. We ask you to ensure these funds are included through the E-rate program in the next COVID-19 legislation passed by Congress.
